



Exploring Alternate Child Care Options

Finding a child care option that meets your family's needs can be challenging, especially after you have exhausted your options for licensed providers. Families often discover that finding child care requires using informal networks within the community.

Here are some additional ways to explore additional child care options.

LOCAL SCHOOLS

- Ask the secretary and other school staff about local child care providers who offer care out of their homes.
- Talk to a high school guidance counselor to help identify responsible teens who might be able to help if you need care in the evenings or weekends.
- Talk to parents in your child's class to learn how they found child care. There could be child care providers in your neighborhood who offer unlicensed care.

SOCIAL MEDIA

- Before posting to social media, **check your privacy settings** to make sure you're comfortable posting about your need for child care within your network.
- Post on your social media accounts that you are looking for child care in your neighborhood. Explore referrals from trusted friends in your social media circle.
- Search social media for local parent groups that would allow you to post your child care needs on their group page.

COLLEGE STUDENTS

- Contact the early childhood programs at local universities or community colleges to see if there are any students looking for work and who have a flexible schedule to provide care.
- Ask if there is an online job board or place where you could post your child care needs.
