Ways Parents Can Thank a Teacher

- Ask teachers for a supply wish list and work with other parents to fill the list. Place all the supplies in a large planter or window box. Add a pencil with a construction paper flower taped to the top with the name of each child. Add a note stating, "Thanks for helping us grow!"
- Set up a walking taco bar for the teachers' lunch with a note saying, "Let'sTACO 'bout how special teachers are!"
- Wash the classrooms windows and leave a note that says, "Thanks for helping kids shine!"
- Donate a book to the classroom.
- Volunteer to help clean the classroom after hours.
- Host a cereal bar breakfast with fruit, milk, and a variety of cereals. Display a sign that says, "We cereal-sly appreciate our teachers!"
- Volunteer to decorate the classroom door. Choose a theme such as adding green shamrocks with the children's names on and a sign that says, "We are lucky you are our teacher!"

Ways Programs Can Thank a Teacher

- Include information about Teacher Appreciation Week in all program communications.
- Write each teacher a handwritten thank you note with specific examples of what makes them special.
- Have each class in your program record a short video saying why they like their teacher(s) and thanking them. Then post the video on your website or social media page.
- Contact the local newspapers, TV stations, and radio stations and let them know it is teacher's week. Ask them to mention your great teachers.
- Contact area merchants to see if they have any give aways or special deals for teachers. Make a list of the deals and give them to the teachers. Title it "Special deals for special teachers."
- Have an afternoon ice cream sundae bar. Display a sign that says, "Here's the scoop, teachers are special!"
- Call local yoga studios or gyms and ask if they will host

a relaxation session at your program for the teachers after hours.

- Work with a local spa to provide mini chair massages for the teachers.
- Give teachers refrigerator magnets that say, "Teaching is my special power!"

Ways to Help Children Thank a Teacher

- Help children use chalk to draw stars with the teachers' names inside to create a mini walk of fame into the building.
- Take several pictures of your child with their favorite artwork from the year and print them out on a mini poster for the teacher. Help your child add why they were their favorites.
- Help your child make a large batch of homemade playdough for the class. Give it to the teacher with a note saying, "I'm dough glad you are my teacher!"
- Have your child decorate a wooden note box with a note inside thanking the teacher. The teacher can use it to store all their thank you notes.
- Take a picture of your child with a "My teacher is special" sign and post to social media.
- Help children create heartfelt letters, cards, messages, and artwork thanking their teacher.
- Help your child put together a s'mores kit to give to the teacher with a note that says, "We need s'more teachers like you!"
